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HISTORICAL CONTEXT


Rochester was found in 1812 and became a large commercial area after the construction of the Erie Canal. Three decades later, Rochester became known as "The Flour City" as railroads were built parallel to the canal and opened resources from the old northwest. It then boomed as one of the thriving cities for expanding transport lines which led to the implementation of a variety of industries throughout the following centuries.

During the mid-eighteenth century, second line industries such as clothing and shoe factories became popular for the civil war's demand for ready-made supplies. This provided jobs for many Rochester residents, employing about 5,000 workers. The gradual achievement of responsible labor organizations, good working conditions, skilled craftsmanship, and enterprising leadership in promotion and management resulted in a leading position in the industrial world of the 20th century. During this period of time, there were concerns for the sweatshops of the sub-contractors labored in crowded houses yet few large concerns sparked for the several hundred workers in four-five story factories that were established on St. Paul and Andrews streets. Firms such as Adler Brothers and Company, Stein, Bloch and Company, Koch and Company appeared and only focussed on the capital investments and value of output--Ithough this made the clothing industry the leading industry in Rochester at the time.

The 1890's began the advance to reduce the number of competing factories and to develop larger corporations. With the advancement of of labor unions, one-fourth of the 64 shoe factories left Rochester to non-union areas due to labor wars and firm's refusal to deal with them.

Thus, in 1894 at the corner of Andrews Street and St. Paul Street, a six-story building was constructed as the Tichner and Jacobi Building and began as a garment factory and retail outlet for \$60,000. At the time, this factory and outlet was a once-booming tailoring company until the top three floors went up in flames 10 years later. The building is easily identified due to its architectural features like the "Tichner & Jacobi" engraved at the top of the structure, along with its classical architectural elements. Along the top of the building features a detailed mosaic brick which stands out in contrast to the existing brick as the exterior finish.

FIRST FLOOR LIGHT MAP














BAR ELEVATION - SOUTH

LOWER LEVEL FLOOR PLAN


LOWER LEVEL REFLECTED CEILING PLAN
